### Coin Lore

#### HARD TIMES TOKENS

Throughout U.S. history, there have been various periods that could be labeled as “hard” times. When it comes to numismatics, the era is generally accepted as being 1832-1844 or so. Andrew Jackson was reelected to the office of President in 1832. He was a wealthy slaveholder and war hero whose followers formed the Democrat party. He was succeeded in office by his Vice President, Martin Van Buren.

Jackson and his followers sought to weaken the Second Bank of the United States by making only silver and gold coins acceptable as payment for public lands. This lead to widespread inflation and a proliferation of paper money issued by state banks and private entities. Ultimately, the vast amount of paper money proved to be worthless.



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During the so-called hard times era, large cent-sized tokens circulated, too. These tokens possessed a cent's worth of copper. Many of them, typically dated 1837 or 1841, closely resembled a large cent. Some of them display "Not One Cent" within a wreath on the reverse. Still others offer political sentiments while many of the tokens advertised goods and services.

There are literally hundreds of varieties of Hard Times tokens available to collectors. The most common of these are scarcer than 1909-S VDB cents yet now sell for twenty dollars or less in lower grades. Unlike the commonly seen wheat cent design, the Hard Times token series offers a wide variety of pictorials, like a running boar, a mythical phoenix arising from flames, an eagle grasping a snake in its beak, a jackass and more ... All in all, this series is a delightful one to collect and cause one to contemplate history!

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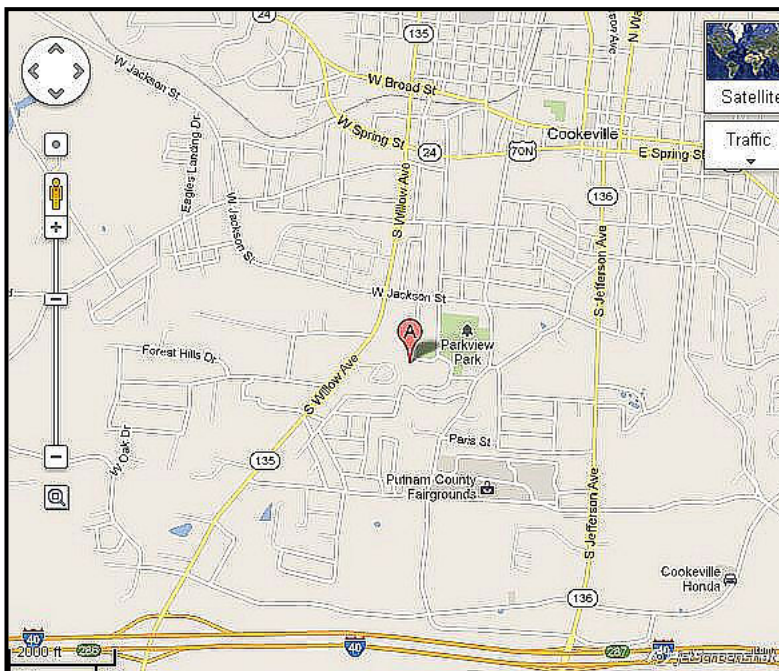
