Coin Lore

In Memory of Lincoln - by Bill Groom

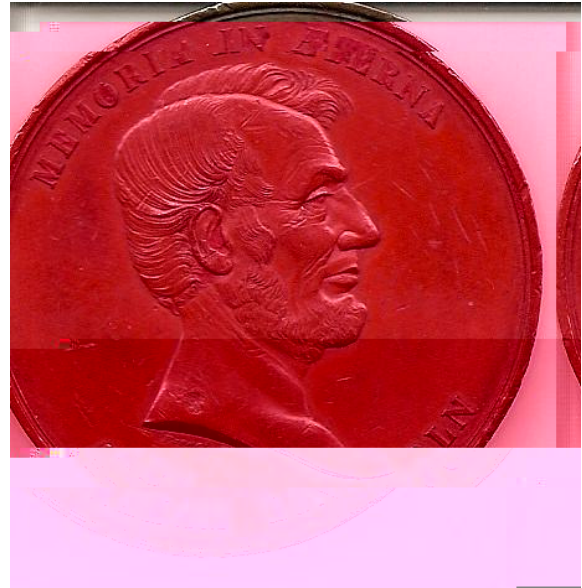
Abraham Lincoln was born 200 years ago. His assassination in 1865 resulted in national mourning. As had countless soldiers, north and south, our 16th President paid the ultimate price for performing his patriotic duty. The pictured medal celebrates Mr. Lincoln's sacrifice and was sold to raise money to provide care for wounded veterans.

The medal was designed by Anthony C. Paquet, a sculptor and engraver who worked for the U.S. Mint, wherein the medal was struck. It measures 57mm in diameter, or the width of three cents in alignment. Made of bronze, this medal is struck on a planchet that is the thickness of two silver dollars.

Paquet's name appears below a well-executed bust of Lincoln that is quite similar to his portrait on our cent. The obverse reads: "MEMORIA IN AETERNA / ABRAHAM LINCOLN" The Latin phrase is the equivalent of "in memory eternal." The reverse legend reads: "NORTH WESTERN SANITARY FAIR / CHICAGO, ILL. / 1865" Lady Liberty is seen in the foreground, carrying the victory flag before warships and encampment tents in the field.

Sanitary fairs were commonplace in the north, both before and after the Civil War ended. Such events were held in many cities. There were military displays, entertainment, and all manner of events that would draw the public to gather and contribute on behalf of the wounded. The sale of medals was but one more means of raising funds.

U.S. Mint records indicate that 1,000 of these medals were ordered, but it is questionable if that many were actually issued and sold. Personally, I've encountered maybe six such medals in the past twenty years; principally, in auctions. They typically sell in the range of \$200-\$400. Designed and issued only a few months after Lincoln's untimely demise, these medals are truly a most artistic tribute to a man who is arguably our most beloved president.
